*ark yet?* I mean, we've gone past the point where the rain we've experienced this spring is more than a headache. It's truly impacting families and businesses, especially those who depend on the land for their income. And though personally it doesn't impact me yet (except some water in the basement), I know that there will be ramifications down the road. And I know there is fear and doubt amongst those who live off the land about what will happen come harvest (if there is much of a harvest).

And that got me thinking about what we depend on. It seems like no matter what, we can rely on the weather being somewhat predictable, right? I mean we know there to be seasons and we trust that year after year things will be about the same. But then we have a spring where we're over 6 inches above average in rainfall for the year and we start to question those cycles. When we thought we could depend on a spring where it'll be dry enough and warm enough to plant crops and gardens, we find that it's difficult if not impossible this year.

And maybe that starts us to question other things we've depended upon. And maybe you're not connected to the land but there have been times in your life where a significant event or a catastrophic letdown changed your perspective. Maybe the death of a loved one, especially a child. Maybe the loss of a job that you thought was secure. Maybe a sudden revelation by a spouse or parent that flipped your world upside down. Maybe it was just that the plans you had in life reveal themselves to be unattainable. Maybe you realized that some of your dreams in life cannot be fulfilled. And so what do we do then? That rock-solid foundation that we've held on to throughout life: a parent, job, spouse, etc, suddenly fails and the bottom drops out of your world. What do you do then?

And I wish I had great advice for you, like a three step process to deal with that turmoil. Unfortunately, I don't. But what I do have is a truth

that I was reminded of by someone this week: God is a God of impossibilities.

And we could go through a list of historical events from the Bible to reveal this. And we could go through the stories of those we know who have experienced the impossible. But to me, it's all about Jesus. When all things in life seem to fall apart and our dreams are starting to fall apart with it, we know that God is a God of life. God is the God who took the most horrible of circumstances, his own son dying on a cross, and made it the most epic event in history. God is a God who raises the dead.

And though what we've always depended upon might be failing us right now, God is always dependable. King David repeated calls God a strong tower, a fortress in times of trouble, and I pray we hold on to that. And I pray we remind each other of that truth as well.
